North of Amersfoort, around Bunschoten-Spakenburg, lies a vast polder landscape. It's an open peat meadow area. This means plenty of grasslands, but also plenty of water. Ditches separate the meadows, which in turn flow into ditches. All this makes it an excellent spot for meadow and water birds, which also occur here in hundreds of numbers. This tour passes through two areas: De Eemland and Het Arkemheen. The latter is one of the oldest polders in the Netherlands, established in 1356. What's special about this polder is that it has never been subject to land consolidation. Winding ditches can still be seen here, in contrast to the straight ditches of the Eemland.

This approximately 35-kilometer bike ride passes through these bird-rich areas. Each cache tells about a specific bird that can be seen there. Inside the cache, you'll also find a bird, but it's different from the one listed. You need this bird to determine your bonus. The value is the number of the cache for that bird.

Example:

In the first cache, you'll find a black-tailed godwit, along with an A.

Cache number 8 tells you about the black-tailed godwit.

So, A=8.

Enjoy this bike ride through the bird-rich Eemlanden and don't forget your binoculars—it's definitely worth it. You might spot some of the caches there.

Grebe




The great crested grebe (*Podiceps cristatus*) is a recognizable water bird. They have a long neck, bright red eyes, a white-masked head with a brown-red halo, and black head feathers. Their upperparts are brown and their underparts white. In spring, pairs of great crested grebes perform a spectacular courtship display. They often nest hidden in reeds, where they lay one to six eggs. The incubation period is about 27 days. The black and white striped chicks soon leave the nest and are kept warm on their parents' backs. After about ten weeks, they are ready to fend for themselves. Great crested grebes primarily eat fish, which they catch by diving. Great crested grebes are true migratory birds. In late summer, they migrate to large, open bodies of water, such as the IJsselmeer lake. They then molt their feathers in large flocks. The great crested grebe is thriving; there are currently approximately 14,000 breeding pairs, and that number is slowly increasing.


